Improving Community Transport Accessibility Across Gippsland

Residents in Sandy Point and Venus Bay will benefit from new transport options to connect them to health care, local businesses, education and more, through a collaborative pilot community electric minibus service supported by the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP).

Through funding of \$249,450 from the DTP'S Flexible Local Transport Solutions Program (FLTSP), the purchase of electric buses will help engage the two communities to reduce their carbon impacts as well as promote inclusion.

Minister for Public and Active Transport Gabrielle Williams said tailored local community projects, like the Gippsland E-Bus trials, are what funding from the Flexible Local Transport Solutions Program is all about.

"Lack of accessible transport services can have a real adverse effect on communities, especially in regional Victoria, so we're doing everything we can to address this," Minister Williams said.

The day-to-day operation and management of the services will be undertaken by the respective committees and local communities, with the pilot being supported by a two-year research project aiming to identify sustainable models to benefit remote communities.

South Gippsland Shire Council - Mayor, Cr Nathan Hersey said the project is innovative and community-led.

"It will create opportunities and social connection for residents in remote communities, by providing transport to neighbouring townships and important health, education and employment services," Mayor Hersey said.

As well as assisting with the promotion and marketing of the new service, the research project will, through contributions from the DTP's Transport Research Team, La Trobe University and the iMOVE Cooperative Research Centre, investigate ways to make the community bus service efficient, financially sustainable and provide a model for other regional communities in Victoria.

iMOVE Program's Director Lee-Ann Breger said transport in regional areas is an ongoing challenge all over Australia.

"This collaboration brings the local community together with government and researchers to investigate an approach that provides immediate benefits for two communities, while also developing a framework that could be applied in many other rural areas," Ms Breger said.

Senior Deputy Vice-Chancellor Research and Industry Engagement La Trobe University, Professor Susan Dodds said the university has a long and proud history of pursuing sustainability and the transition to renewable energy.

"We aim to support that transition through transport research and innovations that increase safety, accessibility and efficiency, such as electric vehicles," Professor Dodds said.

The funding from the Victorian Government is via the FLTSP which provides funding to local government and community organisations for small-scale transport projects, evidence-based transport studies, and funding to redesign and trial new ways in which transport services at a local level can be delivered across the state.

COMMUNITY E-BUS TRIAL PROJECT – for Venus Bay and Sandy Point

COMMUNITY ENERGY MEETS COMMUNITY TRANSPORT -

How it all started: Over the past few months, the Gippsland
Community Power Hub governance group, with support from
Sustainability Victoria— (with whom we have worked to establish
the Microgrid project for Venus Bay Community Centre), has
been working with 5 Gippsland townships (Venus Bay, Sandy
Point, Heyfield, Mallacoota and Phillip Island - all of whom are working towards

building microgrids) to investigate the idea of trialling low-cost community mobility using electric minibuses.

Of these five towns, Phillip Island is already working on an electric bus project, and Sandy Point and Venus Bay were the only ones currently in a position to proceed with such a project.

Working with the **iMove Cooperative Research Centre**, the **Victorian Department of Transport and Planning** and **La Trobe University**, the funds have now been secured for a two-year trial that will mean two electric minibus – both with wheelchair access - have been purchased for Venus Bay and Sandy Point respectively. The **South Gippsland Shire Council** auspiced the funding application.

This project will research, in depth, the viability of the provision of electric mini-buses to provide mobility services to small regional towns that lack public transport options.

Until recently this concept was theoretical only, while we worked with potential partners in other small communities to consider how we might tackle the awful lack of transport services, and we are delighted that this work has now come to fruition.

We are now thrilled to say the project is official – the buses (Joy Long E6 electric mini us) have been registered, the electric vehicle charging station has been installed at the Centre in Venus Bay, and one in Sandy Point and the research component has begun. The Venus Bay Community Centre and Sandy Point community will start working with their local community members and groups to ensure that together, we can best use this resource towards the benefit of our townships.

As part of the 2-year trial, La Trobe University will employ a local research and engagement person for 1 day a week in each township to work closely with the steering groups, stakeholders and community to ensure the project has the greatest chance of success.

The details- The Victorian Government Department of Transport and Planning – through the Flexible Transport Solutions Program have provided funds to secure the 2 electric mini- buses and funds to upgrade the power supply to Venus Bay Community Centre to install 3-phase power and increased battery capacity. iMOVE Cooperative Research Centre along with La Trobe University have provided funds to undertake the 2-year research component of the project. This is an investment of over \$650,000 and demonstrates a partnership approach and willingness to work with local communities to address real issues relating to transport. There will be a significant in-kind volunteer commitment and contribution from the local communities to make this work.

Green Waste Amnesty Period

Council's annual Green Waste Amnesty period is starting soon. The amnesty will run from 4 November until 31 December 2023

Residents can dispose of their green waste for free at any of Council's transfer stations until the end of the amnesty period. The amnesty aims to encourage residents to prepare their properties for the fire season by removing potential fire hazards.

However, to improve the quality of the mulch produced, there are several plant species that **are not accepted** as green waste. This includes:



• Blackberry;

Broom;

Kikuyu Grass;

• Cape Weed;

Agapanthus;

• Pampas Grass.

Ragwort;

Mirror Bush;

Hawthorn:

Gorse:

Blue Butterfly Bush;

Plant species that are difficult to mulch properly **are also not included** in the amnesty such as Palm fronds, Cordylines, Yuccas and related species.

If any of these plant species are taken to a transfer station, they must be disposed of as general waste and the applicable disposal fees paid. Alternatively, they can be disposed of through the kerbside green waste collection service as this is subject to a different composting process.

Bald Hills Wind Farm Community Fund Invites Applications for its 2024 District and Small Grants

The Bald Hills Wind Farm Community Fund (BHWFCF) is inviting organisations with community projects benefiting the Tarwin Lower, Venus Bay and Walkerville districts to submit applications for its 2024 District and Small Grants.



The District grant, is a single grant valued at up to \$15,000, provides an exciting opportunity for a local organisation to develop a significant project to benefit the district community.

The Small Grants, which will be awarded up to the amount of \$2,000 per project, are designed to enable organisations to provide a benefit or service to the local community.

Previous grants have funded such project as:

- Infrastructure upgrades at The Tarwin Recreational Reserve, Mechanics Hall, Men's Shed, Tarwin Lower Pony Club and Venus Bay Community Centre;
- Mobility equipment for the Tarwin Lower and District Community Health Centre;
- Medical equipment for the Venus Bay & District Community Emergency Centre and Tarwin Lower Mechanical Institute:
- IT resources and infrastructure improvements for the Tarwin Lower Primary School;
- Arts projects such as the Venus Bay Water Tank Mural project and the Thirsty Works Gallery; and assistance to the Tarwin Wildlife Shelter, Watch for Wildlife and Community Bee Keeping.



A quick guide to the Tiny Towns Fund

ABOUT THE FUND

Right across rural and regional Victoria, our tiny towns are great places to live and visit.

The new Tiny Towns Fund will support locals to deliver quality community projects, such as splash parks and bike trails, playgrounds, community hall and library upgrades, public art and more.

Towns with a population of up to 5,000 people in the 48 local government areas of regional Victoria are eligible to apply, as well as Alpine Resorts and Melbourne's 10 interface outer metropolitan local government areas.

What the fund will achieve

From barbecues to community centres, the Tiny Towns Fund will back community-driven projects that enhance our smallest towns, strengthen community connections and encourage more visitors to all corners of Victoria.

The fund aims to:

- Create better community infrastructure and facilities
- Support community connection
- Offer even more reasons to live, work, stay and play in rural and regional Victoria
- Enable all residents to participate in their community, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Victorians, people living with disability, LGBTQIA+ communities and people from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds.



Who is eligible

This fund is open to incorporated not-for-profit community organisations and local governments based in Victoria.

Communities with a population of up to 5,000 people are encouraged to apply from:

- Victoria's 48 rural and regional local government areas, as well as Alpine Resorts
- The 10 interface local government areas of Casey City Council, Cardinia Shire Council, Hume City Council, Melton City Council, Mitchell Shire Council, Mornington Peninsula Shire Council, Nillumbik Shire Council, Whittlesea City Council, Wyndham City Council and the Yarra Ranges Shire Council.

Grant funding

Applicants can seek grants between \$5,000 and \$50,000 for each project (exclusive of GST).

Co-contribution requirements

All applicants are required to provide a co-contribution towards the proposed project budget.

The co-contribution may come from the applicant organisation or from other sources but must not be from other Victorian Government programs or sources.

A co-contribution may include:

- Grants from the Australian Government
- Grants/contributions from local government and Alpine Resorts
- Contributions from utility/service providers
- · Contributions from community groups, businesses, or philanthropic organisations.

What could be funded

The fund will support projects that provide a direct benefit to the town and its entire community. Some examples include:

- Upgrades to community facilities such as libraries, community halls and sporting infrastructure
- Improvements to public spaces including public art, street furniture, drinking fountains and greenery, the creation of community gardens, park upgrades and dog parks
- · Updates to local tourism attractions such as splash parks, hiking trails and playgrounds
- Development or improvement of community gathering spaces, such as community gardens, amphitheatres or barbecues
- Networking and relationship building activities that promote participation in community life such as community days and volunteer projects
- Projects that support Traditional Owner communities and groups to enhance and promote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture, community and economic development, participation and leadership.

Project timeline

Projects must be completed within 18 months from the execution of the grant agreement.

How to apply

Applicants are encouraged to read over the Tiny Towns Fund program guidelines in full, taking note of application deadlines.
