ARTCUBES UPDATE





The Venus Bay Community Centre Artcubes project can only be described as a resounding success. The behind-the-scenes work started about the middle of 2024 when the shopkeepers were asked if they agreed that the overflow carpark on the corner of Jupiter Boulevard could be used to situate the Cubes. Having been a construction site for the previous two years, they agreed it was a good site and Council approved.

The concept was to make the site a welcoming usable community space attractive to locals and visitors alike and a place to have good experiences throughout the summer and all the major public holiday weekends. A million ideas were floated, discussed, and sifted through, finally settling on a series of site activations that would encourage people to the site for the benefit of the community and the benefit of the artists.

The project kicked off in style with a well-attended launch in summer sunshine. The band Travelight & Gerard Evans provided a festive atmosphere for all. There were dancers enjoying the live music, picnics, and children experimenting with art activities and physical games rather than devices. Smiling faces were everywhere. We know there were plenty of takeaway dinners from the local shops eaten onsite that night. South Gippsland Water provided us with a water trailer to provide free water to people in town that whole weekend.



This set the scene for the next three months as the program delivered a range of activities to support the rotation of artists through the cubes. Amanda Diamond, Sonia Zalucki and Terrie Thompson introduced us to their creative skills with a smile and plenty of conversation. The denim whales were introduced to the public and 12 lucky owners got to take one home. The KOGO (knit one give one) knitting became a popular activity onsite and elsewhere and is continuing.

Next came Kate Stuart, The Men's Shed and Claire Wieland; we have such a colourful and diverse mix of people, skills, organisations and talents in Venus Bay. How good was the handmade cannon? Sonia Weston chose to do her Cultural Heritage talk on the site

to a willing and interested audience even though it was an extremely warm day. The shade of the banksia trees on the corner gave relief from the heat.

Soon after came the Open Mic—it turned out to be a sweltering day but the talented musicians who chose to join in with Wally's leadership, encouragement and organisation, were loudly applauded. On that same day you could talk to the CFA about fire plans and get all your burning questions answered — children trialled shooting water at targets while Mum and Dad chatted with the CFA members and looked through the Art Cubes. The next rotation there was a space, so Kate Stuart stayed on, working on investigating the geology of the Tarwin River, the colour of the clays, how they respond to shaping and firing. You cannot get

more local than that. Tracie Mitchell continued to dig into her Waste Experiment, focussing this time, on the scraps, the threads, the minutiae of textile waste. Venus Bay's own Ben Everitt filled a cube with his latest book illustrations introducing us all to 'Grandma's Stuff.' Jorja returned to provide another Arty workshop table for children while parents wandered through cubes and talked to artists.





We then trialled an outdoor cinema. The conditions were perfect, and the blankets, chairs, picnics and rugs were rolled out. The movie 'Blueback' was based on a story by Tim Winton and proved to be quite fitting for an art space. The main character, when young, was obsessed with drawing under sea life. Those drawings went on to be the catalyst for their town council declining a large development. Let's hope our creative community comes together if the developers try to 'improve' Venus Bay.

And after all that were exposed to the very accomplished Lily Palmer, Jade McAlear, Mandy Gunn and Cathy Hayward who brought their own highly refined and unique skills to the Artcubes. The grand finale event was touch and go as we watched the weather apps all morning and into the early afternoon. The sky cleared, the clouds of rain went around us and Karavana Flamenca had people up and dancing in no time. The Artcubes shone brightly with their handmade items and the crowd helped us celebrate the end of a wonderful three-month project.

As a Community Centre one of our main aims is to connect community to each other in healthy, respectful ways. The ArtCube project was an ideal vehicle to showcase the skills of local artists and create an environment that people would want to come to whilst experiencing the heart and soul of our unique Community and in one public space!



We know that Art can serve as a powerful catalyst for creative solutions. It encourages unconventional thinking and fosters innovation. Through all its forms, art challenges individuals to perceive problems from new perspectives and explore ideas. Art can stimulate emotion, imagination, conversation and often new approaches and out-of-the-box strategies. The Artcubes are getting ready to leave Venus Bay but the conversations have only just started.

We are all feeling pretty good about that.

What will the legacy of the Artcubes be for Venus Bay? Let us know your ideas.

ADDENDUM:

South Gippsland Shire Council invested in the the ArtCubes as a way to support and enable creative development and community vibrancy in small-towns. Each region that has had the Artcubes has been able to put their own stamp on how they think they will work best for their particular requirements. They



are designed to encourage creative experimentation and expression. As the spaces are intimate, they offer unusual creative possibilities, for artists, performers or community members, as stand-alone venues, or in the context of a larger event or festival.

They are going to Leongatha next where they will undergo a brand-new external look. A mural artist has been engaged for the work and will be providing mentoring to a couple of young people as part of the arrangement.

The timing hasn't quite worked out for the move, and we have been asked, by Council, to extend the occupancy of the Artcubes onsite for another four to six weeks while they work behind the scenes to finalise the details of the move. We will not be activating the site in the same way but will be offering the Cubes as a workspace / studio for up to three people for that time.

Samuel is willing to challenge himself and many others' beliefs by sailing the vessel from Hobart to Sydney and beyond – he has significant global experience in many disciplines.

The project is inspiring people to take new actions to shift the unworkable situation we have created for ourselves, future generations and mother earth. This is a project to interrupt the way human beings think, speak and act about themselves and other people – because the current result is waste showing up in the environment.









An Artist's perspective - Artcube Residency FEB/MARCH 2025

Room with a view to





What could an artist possibly achieve in a residency the size of half a shipping container? One may well ask. Big things come from small packages is my response.

At first the ideas build to hoarder capacity – ending with no wriggle room to breathe. I take a step back. And then....

For me the gold was in pairing back – sitting and letting the size of the small space tell me what to do. Does that sound strange? My aim for this arts residency at Venus Bay was giving myself creative permission to meander into new territories for making.

I wanted to get as loose as possible – to not have to make an object that was for sale – such as the yoga bolsters and floor cushions that I make form discarded fabrics and textiles. To let a flow of making be the driver of my time in the cube.


The cube over a four week period was a small space – to sit in it felt like I was being hugged. I felt supported by the space. It was safe and most significantly it was a moment in time to disengage from the to do list of everyday life.



To make art the priority.

Over the four weeks I felt an incredible sense of freedom. Often as a maker I feel my history as a maker of dance and film inform my identity as an art maker. That that is the limit of my making. But working in the residency I am reminded that my background on dance and film are skills and knowledge that over decades I have gained and I can use and incorporate those skills in anyway I want.

Timothy, the Last Recycled Denim Whale.

Timothy, a handmade whale crafted from recycled denim, has officially been handed over to his new owner. He was the final piece in a small batch collection of fabric whales. The whales made their debut at the Venus Bay Artcube project in January, made by Terrie, each one was constructed using repurposed denim that would have otherwise been sent to landfill.

The collection was created as part of a sustainable crafting project aimed at giving new life to discarded textiles. Each whale featured unique characteristics depending on the denim used—faded washes, distressed details, and sometimes recognizable elements like seams or rivets from the clothing's original form. All the whales came with a name and a story about sustainability and the effects on our oceans.

Unlike the rest of the pod Timothy was crafted especially for his owner and stood out with his barnacles and debris with a set of button eyes salvaged from a shirt. Like the rest of the pod, he was made by hand. The entire collection has now been sold, marking the end of this limited series. Timothy's departure closes the



chapter on the pod of recycled denim whales, all of which have been distributed to buyers who value eco-conscious design and handmade craftsmanship.

Terrie initiated the project as a fundraiser for the Community Centre and to highlight the story of textile waste. The project has made a wonderful donation to help with the services that the Community Centre provides.

No word yet on whether more denim creatures will be produced in the future but keep your eyes open.



Eco warriors cooking up a storm

On Thursday, 24 April the first Eco Cooker workshop was held at the Venus Bay Community Centre. The Eco cooker is a home device that can dramatically reduce your electricity and gas usage in the kitchen. It also allows you to spend less time in the kitchen or camp site hovering over cooking pots, because once you have brought the pot to the boil, you place it in the Eco Cooker and walk away until you are ready to eat. The Eco cooker will cook your rice, stew, or soup for you and also keep your food piping hot for hours.

There were six enthusiastic participants from around the area who all contributed to making their own Eco Cooker. With plenty of support the people who had never sewn before and those with rusty sewing skills were able to cut and sew their own with confidence in a very short space of time.

There was also a cooking demonstration on how to use the Eco Cooker, making a basmati rice vegetable pilaf which cooked while we were cutting out the patterns and sewing the Cookers. Midway, everyone took a well-deserved lunch break and could experience first-hand the joy of opening the Eco

Cooker and being surrounded by the aromas of a steaming and fragrant lunch.



There was great satisfaction from each person when they had their completed and filled Eco Cooker, ready for use. It was a great moment!

The Eco Cooker comes from an initiative in 1976 by a South African woman, Bridget Oppenheimer who created a similar device known as the Wonderbox. The project was aimed at supporting rural women who relied on wood for fuel to cook with and the Wonderbox was going to reduce the fuel required by 80%, which means a lot of wood was not needed to be carried for kilometres to prepare meals for the family. Very soon, the practical and cost-effective Wonderbox made its way into many households over South Africa and now to South Gippsland, Australia.

The way the Eco Cooker works is known as Heat Retention Cooking, which is not a new concept. Over the millennia indigenous people had different ways of retaining heat to cook food with. The Eco Cooker is a semi-modern version that has becomes indispensable in many kitchens and is completely portable.

The Venus Bay Community Centre is sustainability focused and will be hosting more Eco Cooker classes, as well as offering cooking demos with recipes for creative ways to use the cooker. 





This forest is home to many of our most loved and endangered species, such as the Gang Gang, powerful owl, pilotbird and platypus. The creeks and gullies are home to endangered and rare Spiny crayfish and underground the Strzelecki Burrowing crayfish.

After the walk the group had lunch in the forest gathering place, while hearing more about the conservation work Victoria and Stuart have been doing to preserve and protect this amazing area.

Local artist Kate Stuart then led the group in making small tiles from the local clay collected in the river area.
