We're getting a kitchen upgrade!

The Venus Bay Community Centre was thrilled to be successful in a grant application to Stronger Communities Fund recently – with funds to support replacing our 2 gas ovens/cooktops with induction ovens, as well as installing a new compliant rangehood, splash back and induction cookware. Funds also support helping to upgrade the power supply to 3-phase. This is part of our project to fully electrify the Centre – so we can use renewable energy harvested from our solar array and stored in our battery system. (we only have one more piece of the puzzle to replace the gas hot water system).



This project dovetails into the Community Energy work we've been undertaking – including making the Centre a place of resilience so that we can have power when the grid does down.

This will also help our volunteers with programs and activities that support the community – including our weekly FREE LUNCH- all welcome!

Did you know that you can borrow an induction cooktop from your local library? This gives you a chance to try it at home and see how it works for you.



HOME ENERGY AND WATER EFFICIENCY KITS

You can also borrow an energy audit kit from the Library – a device that can identify where you are losing heat/cooling so you can make

your home more energy efficient, more comfortable and save on power bills as well as reducing carbon emissions.

The Kit includes:

Power-Mate Lite

The power-mate lite shows how much electricity an appliance is using and what this is costing you.

Thermal Imaging Camera

The thermal imaging camera shows where hot and cold areas are around your house. It highlights areas where draughts, water leaks and missing insulation might be present.

Energy Saving Thermometer

The energy saving thermometer shows the appropriate operating temperature for heating, cooling, hot water service, fridge, and freezer. It will inform you if you need to adjust your settings.





Water-Flow Measuring Cup

The water flow measuring cup will tell you the flow of your shower and taps in litres per minute.


Venus Bay Angling Club.



South Gippsland Coastal Strategy Adopted

The Coastal Strategy has been implemented to provide strategic direction for our coastal areas and help guide sustainable land use and development.

It covers the following topics:

- Population pressure and development.
- Environment and landscape.
- Development and infrastructure land management.
- Community and economy.



The document is vital for our coastal communities as it helps us to understand, and plan for future challenges such as, increasing demand for residential and commercial development in coastal areas, climate change risks, and ageing infrastructure.


This strategy has been informed and developed through two rounds of extensive community consultation; around 800 people provided comments and submissions which aided in identifying issues and opportunities faced by our coastal areas. Council acknowledges that this document could not have been developed without community feedback and are thankful for the opportunity produce this plan for our region.

For those following the progress of the Cape to Cape Resilience Project – which covers areas between Cape Paterson and Cape Liptrap including:

- The open coast from Cape Paterson along the coastal cliffs adjacent towards Inverloch
- The open foreshore and surf beach at Inverloch
- The dynamic estuaries and tidal mudflats of Anderson Inlet
- The open coast and dunes of Venus Bay south to Cape Liptrap
- Inland from the coastline, allowing for assessment of estuary and groundwater impacts.

In August 2023, the Project Control Board endorsed the final draft of the Resilience Plan. The team is actively engaged in briefing project partners, including the two local government authorities and Parks Victoria, ensuring alignment with the broader goals of partner agencies, local communities, and other coastal land managers. These briefings are vital to secure the necessary support and identify how partners will be involved in implementing the actions in the Resilience Plan.

The Cape to Cape Resilience Project aligns with stages of Victoria's Resilient Coast - Adapting for 2100+ framework which:

- outline Victoria's strategic approach to coastal hazard risk management and adaptation
- were developed with collaborative partners across the State over 2021–2022
- are made under the Marine and Coastal Act 2018, and must be followed when planning, assessing and managing coastal hazard risk under the Marine and Coastal Policy (2020).

Our plan for action

Five energy pathways

Five possible pathways for co-ordinated installation of renewable energy that could result in a microgrid for Venus Bay and Tarwin Lower.

When the pathways are combined, we can reach a target of OMW of energy imported from the main grid, increasing our resilience and self-sufficiency.

The benefit of developing Pathways #1, #2 and #3 early could result in significant savings in energy costs for households, community organisations and local businesses

Pathways #4 and #5 can support the households, businesses and community facilities that are not able to install rooftop solar and batteries and provide the balance of electricity for everyone.

Monitoring and review

A co-ordinating group and several working groups are the most likely ways of organising and governing the implementation of this plan. Advisory Group members and additional community members are invited to continue their involvement and how they choose to monitor and evaluate this plan will be determined by them, based on final agreed action plans. The suggested starting point for co-ordinating, monitoring and evaluating action is bi-monthly working group meetings for Pathways 1, 2 and 3, and quarterly combined meetings of the Working Groups with the Co-ordinating Group. Quarterly community updates on progress and an annual event focussing on what's been achieved and what's next to do are also recommended.




Open Studio Art Trail

ENERGY BILL RELIEF FOR HOUSEHOLDS IN VICTORIA

Eligible Victorian households can get help with their energy bills from 1 July 2023 through the <u>Energy Bill</u> Relief Fund. The Victorian Government is administering the bill relief.

If you meet one of these eligibility criteria, you may be entitled to a \$250 rebate on your energy bill:

- Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) Gold Cards
- Health Care Cards (including Low Income Health Care Card)
- Pensioner Concession Card
- Carer Allowance
- Commonwealth Seniors Health Card
- Family Tax Benefit A and/or B
- DVA Gold Cards (Dependent)



How to get it

In most cases your electricity provider will automatically apply the bill relief to your electricity account to reduce the amount you owe on your next bill. How and when this happens depends on your situation.

If you already get help from your state government

If you already get a <u>Victorian electricity concession</u>, you don't need to do anything. You will start getting the bill relief from 1 July 2023.

If you are eligible for help from your state government but do not currently get it

If you think you are eligible for a Victorian electricity concession but aren't getting it, you should contact your electricity retailer to register. You will then also get the new bill relief from 1 July 2023.

If you have an eligible card or get a payment from Services Australia

If you aren't already eligible for a <u>Victorian electricity concession</u>, but you have one of the eligible concessions from Services Australia on 31 July 2023, you will be contacted directly by Services Australia in September 2023 to tell you what you need to do.

If you have an eligible card from DVA

If you aren't already eligible for existing Victorian electricity bill concession schemes, but you have an eligible DVA card on 31 July 2023 please contact your electricity provider from now up until 31 June 2024 to apply. They will ask you for your Unique Identification Number (UIN) or Veteran File Number and consent for them as the provider to check your eligibility

When you will get it

If you already receive a concession from your state government, your energy retailer will automatically apply the first instalment of \$125 to your account in August; you do not need to provide any further information. A second and final instalment of \$125 will be applied to your account in February 2024.

If you aren't already eligible for a <u>Victorian electricity concession</u>, but you have one of the eligible concessions from Services Australia on 31 July 2023 you will be contacted by Services Australia in September and asked to lodge your consent through an online workflow. Once your consent has been lodged, your retailer will start to apply the single payment of \$250 from November.



Venus Bay Streetscape Things are going well and thankfully starting in the risky weather period didn't hamper things too much, we are still due for completion before the summer holidays. Thanks everyone for your patience especially our businesses, in the meantime - shop local everyone shop local!

Over the next few weeks you'll start seeing a streetscape not a war zone and it would be a good idea for the plant boffins amongst you to think about what these plantings should be, there are more plant beds and something tells me not pansies and daffodils!

Wastewater Issues on Jupiter Boulevarde When I ran for council I said I even love the messy stuff about this place but this month has been over the top with the street dug up and the unrelated catastrophic failure of the septic in our business district!! Just to be clear this septic is not a council responsibility but an issue between the building owners and tenants, it also had nothing to do with the street works, just terrible timing.

What happened is: On 19 September, Council issued a Prohibition Notice and an Improvement Notice pursuant to the *Environment Protection Act 2017* (Vic) to the landowners of 114-116 Jupiter Boulevard, Venus Bay. The notices were issued based on inspection and independent analysis which revealed that the wastewater system that services the property had suffered a catastrophic failure and was presenting an urgent health risk to the community and the environment. The notices require the landowners to prevent any further use of the wastewater system, until it can be repaired or replaced. Council is currently working with the Owners Corporation at 114-116 Jupiter Boulevard to find a workable and compliant solution.

Summer Safety I cannot tell you how many amazing volunteers hold this place together and provide all of the emergency support day in day out of their sense of community and love for this extraordinary place.

The East Gippy fires on Grand Final weekend were a sharp reminder to us all that we each must have a plan that considers all the different risks living in this magic part of the world brings; the best plan on very high fire danger and above days is don't be here, did you know in Venus Bay there is no safe place? In the case of the Tarwin road being cut off in flood you may need to have provisions to last a bit longer than normal. When power goes you lose water, fill water containers when you know a storm is coming or a likely power outage.

These tips may sound alarmist but to help our volunteers please make sure you and your guests and visitors know the plan. Make your plan as simple or complex as you like, make sure it includes early actions you will take so if an emergency hits you aren't starting from step 1. 
It has been a couple of months since we have had our floors refinished and things are looking great.

The Healthy Chocolate bars were delicious and so was the flatbreads

For anyone who missed out the recipes are as follows.



Chocolate Oatmeal Bars

4 cups semi ground instant oats
2 cups of coconut
250 grams salted butter – melted
¾ cup of maple syrup
120 grams dark chocolate powder (or cooking chocolate)
Mix all the dry ingredients together, add melted butter and maple syrup.
Mix well, Press into tray, Put in fridge to cool and set
Cut into slices

Flatbreads

3 cups plain flour, 1 tsp baking powder, 1 tsp Himalayan salt, 1 ½ cups plain Greek yoghurt (room temp)

2 Tbsn olive oil, 1 tsp garlic powder (optional)

Whisk all dry ingredients in bowl and make a well in the centre

Add yoghurt and olive oil mix till it all comes together. Knead until soft dough is formed it doesn't need long. Cover with cling wrap or plate and set aside to rest at room temperature.

Dust the work bench lightly with flour. Divide dough in half, then divide each half in 4 equal size pieces. You will have 8 in total. Roll each piece into a ball. Flatten them out with the palm of your hand and then using a rolling pin to roll each piece 2 mm think and approx. 10 cm diameter

Lightly grease a nonstick frypan with olive oil spray or small brush of oil.



Heat pan on medium cook one side for about 1-2 mins or has small brown spots then spray top and flip and cook repeat with remaining flatbreads. As they come out of the pan if you place them on a clean tea towel and wrap them in the towel this will keep them warm and soft.
